

STEWARDSHIP FOREST RULES

You are making a voluntary decision to use these trails and do so at your own risk. There are potentially hazardouz conditions both on and off-trail and you may encounter unexpectedly dangerous acts of man and/or nature. Anything could happen out there, so be prepared. You are responsible for your own safety, so please follow the rules.

These are multi-use trails (biking, hiking, running, etc.). In particular, hunting is allowed on this property and hunters have been using this site long before these trails were built. Always yield to oncoming trail users. Dogs must be leashed at all times. **Respect other trail users** and be good ambassadors of your sport.

Some trails are designed to be traveled in a specific direction. Where necessary, one-way arrows are shown on this map. To maximize your trail use pleasure and to minimize unessecary head-on collisions, please **follow all trail signage.**

For your own safety and so that we can keep these trails open, stay on marked trails at all times. Marked trails are your best bet to get home without a detour to the emergency room. Geisinger Stewardship Forest is surrounded by private property on every side. Please follow trail signage and respect private property.

Be a good steward. Leave no trace. When trails are excessively wet, walk, this avoids widening & erosion. Trail stewards are active trail users who have a sense of community and wish to volunteer in making the trails better for all users.
